

Celebrating the Life of Joseph Gillespie

On Monday, March 18, 2024, Joseph (Joe) Lorenzo Gillespie Jr. peacefully departed this life after battling a long illness.

Joseph Lorenzo Gillespie, Jr. was born on June 4, 1944, in Fayetteville, North Carolina to Joseph L. Gillespie, Sr. and Nannie M. (Bryant) Gillespie. Joe (also known as Junior) excelled academically throughout school. He attended Newbold Elementary School, Washington Drive Junior High School, and E.E. Smith Senior High School. During his years within the Fayetteville school system, Joseph received outstanding accolades in football, basketball, baseball, track and tennis, and served as team captain and earned All-State recognition in high school football. Joseph graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics and Biology from Fayetteville State Teacher's College (now Fayetteville State University). During his time at Fayetteville State, Joe became a member of Epsilon Beta Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated. He also earned the position of team captain and All-CIAA honors as a safety for Fayettteville State's Broncos football team.

After migrating from North Carolina and settling in Washington, DC, on October 1, 1966, Joe married his lifelong love (since 3rd grade) Barbara Ann (McNeill) Gillespie and they moved to Capital Heights, Maryland. From this union, were born two children, Kimberly Gillespie and Travis Gillespie. Joseph and Barbara had been married for 47 years.


Joe honed his academic background in Mathematics by pursuing a career in education, which expanded over 40 years. Joe taught at Roper Junior High, Spingarn High (S.T.A.Y.), Kelley Miller Middle and H.D Woodson High School in Washington, DC. After retiring from the District of Columbia school system, he was sought after to continue teaching high school math (Algebra I and II) to students at Suitland High School in Prince George's County Maryland. Joe's love for sports extended from playing tennis to coaching football at the high school level. He also supported and had a positive impact on inner-city youths through the Boys & Girls Club of Washington, DC. Joe's love for his three grandsons was steadfast as he was present and chauffeured them to football, and basketball games.

Joe's presence, kind spirit, and charming conversation enriched many lives, including those that cared for him at SpringTime Homes assisted living in Upper Marlboro, Maryland and Complete Care Nursing Home in Annapolis, Maryland. His witty personality and dynamic way of storytelling kept us laughing and thinking all at once.

Joe was a physical force on the field, I remember watching Joseph play and watching the crowd quiver as Joseph put the pads on against potential receivers. This guy would hit you and would hit you hard. As I heard in the stands so often, "When that Joe Gillespie hit you, you did not want to run his way again." Hey, that was just how he played the game!

Joe had a natural instinct when it came to sports, during a different time in a different era, he would have been a professional football player. Black athletes in the sixties and early seventies had little or no opportunities to play pro sports, regardless of having superior athletic talent like Joseph Gillespie. Hopefully, Joseph will eventually become an E.E. Smith High School and Fayetteville State University Hall of Famer.


Now that the Sun has set on my brother-in-law, Joe and my sister Barbara, may they rest together in peace in the arms of our almighty God.






